A Beginner's Guide To **Embroidery**

Step 1: What You'll Need to Start Embroidering



To start embroidering, you'll need the following items:

- embroidery hoop this is a ring consisting of two parts. You put the fabric in between the hoops this helps keep it taut, making the embroidering easier. These come in plastic and wood - I prefer plastic for doing the embroidering and wood for displaying the embroideries.
- small, sharp scissors. You can find these under many names - though a google search for "embroidery scissors" will get you what you need.
 :D
- your fabric of choice! Linen, quilting cotton, canvas and osnaburg are all great choices! It should not be too loosely woven or too tight.
- embroidery floss. This is cheap and comes in TONS of colors. I prefer DMC floss and use it exclusively.
- embroidery needles. These have bigger eyes than normal needles to accommodate the size of the floss.
- a water soluble marker or other marking tool.
 This way you can draw designs onto your fabric!
 It's best it you use a water soluble pen so you can rinse the markings out with cold water at the end.
- whatever fabric you like! Muslin, quilting cotton, canvas and linen all work well. I typically embroidery on a linen blend.

Step 2: How to Use an Embroidery Hoop



Embroidery hoops come in many flavours, though the basic circular wood and plastic ones are the most common.

Cut a square of fabric slightly larger than your hoop.

To start, loosen the screw at the top of the hoop. You'll then separate the hoops. Place the outer hoop to the side - we'll worry about it in a second!

(If you're using a plastic hoop, the inside hoop will have a lip. This lip can come over the top of the hoop OR hang below the bottom. Your choice! See the last photo for how I assemble my plastic hoops.

Lay the piece of fabric over the plain inside hoop.

After you have the fabric over the inside hoop, push the top hoop down over the inside one. This will sandwich the fabric between them. Now you'll want to tighten the screw a bit and begin pulling the fabric taut. The fabric floating between the hoops should not give very much - this will make the embroidering much more complicated than it should be.

After the fabric is taut, keep tightening the screw until it feels secure to you. But not so tightly you can't budge it! You'll regret that once you've embroidered for a couple hours and your sore fingers can't open the hoop.

Step 3: Threading the Needle and All About Floss



Needle threading can be a little complicated at times. I've found the easiest way to do it is to wet the very end of the floss (yes, put it in your mouth.) and squish it between your thumb and forefinger. This will flatten it out and allow it to pass through the eye of the needle with less fuss.

Also: keep in mind that you do not double the floss as you sometimes do with thread. You're simply going to pull the thread through the eye and let a few inches hang loose. You'll knot the other end as usual.

Step 4: How to Do the Running Stitch



Done just as it is in regular sewing. You can make the stitches long or short or randomly placed depending on your design.

You can either do the standard up and down, or push the needle through and make several stitches at once. For new embroiderers, I recommend using the up and down method just until you get the hang of spacing.

Step 5: How to Do the Backstitch



- 1. Bring your needle through to the front of the fabric and take a stitch to the right.
- 2. Bring the needle back to the front of the fabric a stitch length to the right and then pass the needle through to the back of the fabric using the hole at the end of the first stitch. (As shown in the second photo)
- 3. Use the hole at the end of the farthest right stitch to bring the needle back to the front of the fabric.
- 4. Repeat until you're done!

You can backstitch to the left or the right - but try it to the right first to get the rhythm down. As long as you keep your stitches even lengths it will look great!

The most important thing about backstitching is to make sure you're using the hole that forms at the end of a stitch to start the next stitch anytime you can. Take a look at the back of my back stitch - see how everything is nice and neat? That's what you want. You'll use less floss that way and keep everything nice and organized.

Step 6: How to Do the Split Stitch



This is a great raised decorative stitch. It can be used much like a backstitch and works much like one.

For this stitch you'll pull the thread up and make a small stitch (no bigger than a grain of rice works best!). You'll then come back up through the middle of that stitch and take it back down through the fabric a short distance away in the direction you're going in. It's best to keep your stitches pretty short (1/8 of an inch to 1/4 of an inch.) when doing this - otherwise your stitches look messy and they won't conform to curves as much as you'd like.

Step 7: How to Make a French Knot



French knots are considered to be a nightmare for most embroiders, but I love them. They're very delicate and cute and they never look the same.

Their size can also vary greatly, so you can use them in a ton of ways. (Check the first photo - the top row is French knots made with six strands of floss wrapped once, the second row the knots are wrapped twice!) You can use them for the center of flowers, as eyes, for polka dots, and even as lines if you're feeling patient.

To pull off a french knot successfully, you'll need to follow these steps:

- pull the floss through to the front of the fabric.
- wrap the floss that's between the fabric and the needle around the needle 1, 2, or 3 times. (One time is a small knot, 2 is medium, 3 is large.)
- hold the floss tightly so that it is wrapped around the needle.
- with your other hand, push the needle through to the back of the fabric very close to where the floss emerged.
- keep holding the floss taut and pull the needle all the way through.
- practice this a few hundred times until it becomes second nature.

You'll knot these on the back as normal. For the cleanest work (if you're not making loads of them!), tie off between each french knot. Otherwise, you'll have tails everywhere if the knots are spread out!

Step 8: How to Do the Stem Stitch



The stem stitch is fantastic for vines, branches, flowers and outlines. It also looks great for text, but you've gotta be careful with sharp corners.

A stem stitch is similar to a backstitch, but instead of linking stitches at the ends, you're going to bring the needle up for the next stitch right next to the last stitch.

Make a small stitch about the length of a grain of rice. Bring the needle back up through the fabric on the right or left side of the previous stitch, fairly close to the end of that stitch as shown in the second photo. Keep starting your new stitches on the same side of the stitches you're already put down.

Step 9: How to Do the Satin Stitch



Satin stitch is great for adding big splashes of color to dom. your embroideries - filling in letters and shapes and all kinds of things!

Satin stitch can be done in many ways. You can outline a shape with backstitching and then fill it in. You can do satin stitch on its own with no outline. You can also backstitch an outline and then satin stitch completely over it to get a slightly raised area.

To practice satin stitch, first draw a simple shape on your fabric. Then use a backstitch to outline it. Then you'll simply go back and forth across the shape (I always like to start in the middle, but it's personal preference.) until it's filled in.

Try it again using the other two methods!

The two most important things about satin stitch are:

getting as close as possible to the outlines so that your satin stitch looks nice and full - you can always go back and fill in those bald spots with seed and straight stitches, but it's easier to get it right the first time!

don't continue your satin stitch on the back of your work. It'll waste your embroidery thread and make your work bulky! To avoid this, bring you thread to the front for the first time right next to the outline on the left. Then, bring it across, and down next to the right outline. Instead of crossing over to the left side of the outline on the back of the fabric, just bring the needle right back up next to where you just pushed it through. That way you're saving thread and time.

Step 10: How to Do Straight and Seed Stitches



These are similar to running stitch - you're just not following a line! The placement is normally very random

Straight stitches can vary in length and are wonderful for filling in areas with loads of texture. Seed stitches are very tiny - you'll be catching just a few threads with these! Seed stitches are most often used to fill areas in. Straight stitches can be used for a ton of different things - filling things in, adding detail, shading, etc.





CEO Chat

Highlights from the 26 July Council Meeting

Council adopted the 2023/24 Shire of Lake Grace Budget. This is a culmination of many months work behind the scenes by office staff and Councillors. Whilst rate rises are inevitable, this years rates increase has been locked in at 3% which is well below the inflation rate whilst still maintaining sufficient resources to carry out our works and services as well as placing funds in our Reserves to provide for future requirements.

Other resolutions passed included:

- The approval of a development application submitted on behalf of Farmers Centre (1978) Pty Ltd for the construction of a new shed on its property in Stubbs Street Lake Grace.
- The appointment of Fire Control Officers throughout the Shire.
- Council adopted the AIM Hospital Museum Interpretation Plan.
- Council received the proposal from the Newdegate Historical Society regarding the purchase of the St Francis of Assisi Anglican Church in Newdegate to be used to house archives.
- Council will undertake a review of all its local laws as required by the Local Government Act 1995.

BUDGET REPORT 2023/2024

General Rates

The budget has been formulated with an increase of 3% on rate in the dollar for GRV (within town site) rate revenue and 3% on rate revenue for UV properties. The UV valuations carried out by Landgate substantially increased the value of these properties which has had a bearing on the setting of rates. This has led to the rate increase being formulated off total revenue that was raised the previous year thus reducing the rate in the dollar.

Rising input costs required to maintain our main source of expenditure, being roads, and the increased pressure being placed on the shires vast network of gravel roads (2500km) by an increase in the size of machinery and increased machinery movements have a big impact on the Shires ability to maintain the roads to a suitable standard that is demanded by the main users. Rate increases assist in provision of service delivery that meets reasonable community needs. It also ensures that critical infrastructure asset renewal is somewhat funded over the time frame of the Long term Financial Plan.

Borrowings

There will be no new borrowings for 2023/24. The outstanding loan principal at 1 July 2023 is \$1,213,744. The principal repayments for 2023/24 amount to \$177,282 and interest payable of \$38,474 leaving a balance of \$1,036,462 at 30 June 2024.

Reserve Transfers

Transfers to Reserves total \$1,321,718 which includes \$210,884 interest, Lake Grace Sewerage Reserve \$100,00, Housing \$400,00, Swimming Pool \$175,834, Land Development \$135,000, Plant Replacement \$200,00 and Newdegate Stadium Floor \$100,00. Nil will be transferred out of Reserves. This will give a total closing balance of \$6,593,811.

Budget Focus

The 2023/24 Budget provides as normal, funds to meet the on-going operations of the Shire which includes shire building and facilities, parks and gardens, and recreational facilities maintained to acceptable standards, maintaining and upgrading the Shire's extensive road system which totals some 2,500 kilometres.



Perseids Meteor Shower | 12th/13th August

The further north you are in WA, the better it is for this meteor shower.

This month, stargazers will be treated to a special display from the Perseids Meteor Shower. On a dark night, away from artificial light pollution, you might see up to 60 meteors (or "shooting stars") an hour!

The Perseids meteor shower is generated from comet Swift -Tutle and renowned for producing bright meteors. The shower peaks on the night of the 12th/13th of August but can be viewed several days either side of the peak. The best views will be under dark skies, after midnight. This shower emanates from the constellation Perseus, which is not visible to the south western regions of WA. Those in northern WA might be high enough to make the most out of the shower.

When to look: From midnight to early morning, 12th/13th August

Which direction to look: Low on the northern horizon

Do I Need a Telescope to see a Meteor Shower?

You don't need a telescope or binoculars to see a meteor shower. It's a great time to gather with friends, roll out your favourite picnic rug, pack the drinks and snacks, and start counting how many "shooting stars" you all see! It's best to view a meteor shower under a dark night sky. Most meteors will be quite faint so darker surroundings will make it easier to see them. You might consider heading out to a dark sky location at one of WA's Astrotourism Towns. If you're an Astro photographer, it is an excellent opportunity to image meteors over some of WA's iconic

landscapes. Where are WA's Astrotourism Towns? Fingers crossed for a spectacular show!

What is a meteor shower?

Meteors are caused by debris entering Earth's atmosphere. The debris can be as small as a grain of sand which burns up in the atmosphere and causes a bright streak of light to appear briefly in our night sky. The debris that causes a meteor can be travelling between 11 to 73 km/second. A meteor shower is a time when you see lots of "shooting stars". They are the result of Earth passing through the trail of debris left by a comet or other object that has come into our Solar System and orbited around the Sun.

What is the Moon phase, and will it affect viewing?

While the Moon will be in the sky during the Perseids this year, it is sufficiently small and dim that it should not affect your viewing too greatly. Most meteors should still be visible, particularly the bright ones!

Something interesting

Meteor showers are named after the constellation where the "shooting stars" appear to be coming from. In the case of the Persieds Meteor Shower, the meteors come from the direction of the constellation of Perseus. If you have a handy smart phone app that helps you identify objects in the night sky, search for Gemini, and you'll be looking in the right location.

CRIME NEWS

We've had an increase in family violence incidents in the past few weeks. Family Violence is not always physical and can also be any of the following: Sexual Violence, Emotional Violence, Psychological Violence, Spiritual Violence, Cultural Violence, Verbal Abuse, Verbal Abuse, and Neglect.

If you, or someone you know, is involved in an incident or circumstances that might be considered Family Violence you can contact Crisis Care on 9223 1111 or 1800RESPECT, a confidential information, counselling and support service that operates 24/7. In an emergency always contact police on 000.

CYBER BULLYING

We have been made aware that cyberbullying is still occurring within our community, particularly with school aged children and teens.

Whilst there is no specific offence of cyberbullying in Western Australia there are various offences relating to harassment, threats, and intimidation that occurs over the internet, it doesn't matter if your using a computer in your home or mobile phone or tablet, it's all the same.

Some examples of cyberbullying related offences are:

Threats

If the behaviour involves using the internet or a phone in a threatening, harassing or offensive way then charges can be laid. If a threat to hurt someone is made then criminal charges may result with a penalty of up to 10 years imprisonment.

Stalking

Stalking can also occur when someone gets repeated messages that frightens, or intimidates, them. Under the Criminal Code a stalking offence can attract a penalty of up to three years imprisonment.

Unauthorised access

If you log into someone else's online account without permission then you can be charged with unauthorised access which can result in up to two years imprisonment.

What can be done about cyberbullying?

If you, or your child, are a victim of cyberbullying it is important that you tell someone, and take measures so it stops. It is important to know how to block communications from cyberbullies. If you are at school, then inform the school immediately if it is occurring.

Internet service providers and social media sites also have policies on cyberbullying and can block a person once a complaint has been made.

If cyberbullying continues, you can report it to the police, or email the Technology Crime Unit at Technology.Crime@police.wa.gov.au. If the harassment is by phone you can report the behaviour to your phone provider. The provider may investigate and send the person a warning letter. A phone company also has the ability to suspend, or cancel, a person's account. If the behaviour continues, and you are being stalked, intimidated, harassed, or threatened you can also apply to the court for a protection order to prohibit the person from contacting you.

Grain Brokers Australia Weekly Market Report

Tough summer hits EU grain production outlook...

The gloss has been wiped off 2023/24 European Union crop production over the last month after much drier than average growing conditions depleted soil moisture reserves across large parts of western, central and northern Europe, as well as the eastern regions of Romania over the last twelve weeks. The negative yield impact has been amplified in many regions by distinctly warmer than usual temperatures through most of June and July.

Now rainy conditions are forecast for much of Northern EU, creating challenging harvest conditions and raising winter crop quality concerns. After a dry summer, the rains are coming at the worst possible time, with the primary benefit being replenished soil moisture reserves ahead of the autumn planting campaign.

The European Commission's (EC) latest production estimates were released late last week, and it has pegged total cereal production for the EU-27 (which excludes the United Kingdom) at 276.02 million metric tonne. This was off a planted area of 50.63 million hectares for an average yield across soft wheat, corn, barley, triticale, oats, rye, durum wheat and sorghum of 5.45 metric tonne per hectare. This is down across the board month-on-month and compares to last season's area, yield and total production numbers of 51.05Mha, 5.24MT/ha and 267.68MMT, respectively.

Last week's 2023/24 output update pegged soft wheat production at 127.43MMT off 21.92Mha for an average yield of 5.81MT/ha. This compares to 126.74MMT off 21.9Mha and an average yield of 5.79MT/ha last year. This season's EU-27 barley yield is now expected to be 4.74MT/ha, down 6 per cent from 5.03MT/ha in 2022. The planted area is relatively unchanged year-on-year at 10.36Mha, but production is estimated to be 5.7 per cent lower than last year's harvest at 49.14MMT.

Corn is the second biggest cereal grain produced in the EU each season, and output from this year's harvest is expected to be 21 per cent higher year-on-year at 63.24MMT but 13.9 per cent lower than the previous season's output of 73.48MMT. This year's planted area presently sits 4.5 per cent lower than last season at 8.45Mha, but the projected yield is the big mover, increasing 26.7 per cent from 5.91MT/ha in 2022 to 7.48MT/ha this season.

EU oilseed production is projected at 32.98MMT, 5.6 per cent higher than the 2022 harvest, which binned 31.23MMT. It is also 9.26 per cent higher than the 2021 harvest of 30.19MMT and 10.5 per cent higher than the five-year average of 29.84MMT. Rapeseed, or canola, is the biggest oilseed crop grown in the EU, with projected production currently sitting at 19.44MMT, 58.9 per cent of the total EU oilseed crop.

France is the EU's biggest grain producer and exporter, with total cereal production in 2023/24 expected to be 63.79MMT off 8.85Mha for an average yield of 7.2MT/ha across all commodities. Production is up 5.5 per cent year-on-year from 60.3MMT, off a slightly higher planted area of 8.96Mha.

French farm agency France AgriMer advised late last week that crop conditions were stable to slightly worse in the week to July 24, as the winter harvest continues to lag last season's pace by an average of three days, but still two days ahead of the five-year average. Late frosts in April in the eastern regions and a total lack of rain from mid-May to mid-June strongly reduced the production potential in the northern two-thirds of the country.

The EC is currently expecting French soft wheat production to be 35.48MMT, up 5.1 per cent from 33.67MMT last harvest, off a slightly increased area of 4.77Mha. As of late last week, 78 per cent of the French soft wheat crop was rated good to very good, down from 80 per cent a week earlier but much higher than the 63 per cent rating at the same time last year. The wheat harvest advanced by 24 percentage points week-on-week to 83 per cent complete as of July 24, well behind last year's pace of 94 per cent but still ahead of the five-year average of 75 per cent.

With the winter barley harvest now complete, the final FranceAgriMer rating was 80 per cent good to very good, significantly higher than the 62 per cent rating for the same category a year earlier. The Spring barley conditions were stable at 73 per cent good to very good, compared with the 48 per cent recorded in the same week in 2022. The hot, dry summer has accelerated spring barley harvest activities significantly, advancing 22 percentage points across the week to July 24 to be 91 per cent complete compared to the five-year average of 65 per cent.

Grain Brokers Weekly Report Cont...

This season's French rapeseed production is currently forecast at 4.63MMT, up 2.6 per cent from 4.51MMT in 2022 and the highest since 2018. The estimate is based on an expected yield of 3.44MT/ ha, down from 3.68MT/ha last year, and an estimated planted area of 1.35Mha, up from 1.23Mha in 2022.

The dry spring and summer and warmer than average temperature over the last eight weeks has also stressed crops through most of Germany, the EU's second biggest grain producer, leading to a 3.2 per cent reduction in the total cereal output forecast to 42.16MMT. The soft wheat crop accounts for over 51 per cent of that estimate at 21.64MMT, itself down 3.4 per cent compared to last year. The planted area of 2.88Mha is down 2.3 per cent compared to the 2022 harvest, and the forecast yield is 1.1 per cent lower at 7.53MT/ha.

German barley production is projected to be down 4.2 per cent to 10.75MMT this season, primarily due to a sharp reduction in the average yield from 7.08MT/ha to 6.71MT/ha. The planted area actually rose slightly year-on-year to 1.6Mha. The nation's rapeseed crop has suffered badly under the unseasonal conditions, with the projected yield down 9.3 per cent year-on-year to 3.61MT/ha. And despite a sharp increase in the planted area to 1.17Mha, the harvest is still expected to be lower than in 2022 at 4.21MMT.

While the EU's grain export facilities will be kept busy shipping the increased output from its member states this season, the EU's agriculture commissioner Janusz Wojciechowski stated last week that it is ready to export almost all of Ukraine's agriculture goods via "solidarity lanes", following Russia's withdrawal from the UN-backed Black Sea grain corridor. Wojciechowski said 60 per cent of Ukraine's exports were shipped via solidarity lanes while the UN-backed grain deal was in operation, and 40 per cent went via the Black Sea.

The commissioner added that the EU was looking at several initiatives from member states to develop a joint plan to cover the additional transport costs for exporting Ukraine's agricultural goods. While expanding grain transit through the EU is sensitive for Ukraine's neighbours, where local farmers have come under financial pressure from increased Ukrainian imports, the commission felt confident a solution could be found that addresses the concerns of its members and keeps Ukraine's surplus grain moving into the international market.



Lessons in Chemistry

Your ability to change everything - including yourself - starts here

Chemist Elizabeth Zott is not your average woman. In fact, Elizabeth Zott would be the first to point out that there is no such thing.

But it's the early 1960s and her all-male team at Hastings Research Institute take a very unscientific view of equality. Forced to resign, she reluctantly signs on as the host of a cooking show, *Supper at Six*. But her revolutionary approach to cooking, fuelled by scientific and rational commentary, grabs the attention of a nation.

Soon, a legion of overlooked housewives find themselves daring to change the status quo.

Passionfruit Cheesecake Bars

Ingredients

- 75g unsalted butter, chopped
- 1/2 cup (125g) brown sugar
- 2 tbs runny honey
- 2 1/2 cups (85g) puffed rice cereal
- 1/3 cup (30g) desiccated coconut



CHEESECAKE FILLING

- 4 sheets titanium-strength gelatine
- 400ml coconut cream
- 500g cream cheese, chopped, at room temperature
- 2 cups (500ml) thickened cream
- 1 cup (120g) icing sugar, sifted
- 1 tsp vanilla bean paste

- 3/4 cup passionfruit pulp (from approx. 6-8 passionfruit)
- Juice of 1/2 lemon
- 1/4 cup (55g) caster sugar

Method

Lightly grease a 20cm x 30cm slice pan and line with baking paper.

Place butter, sugar, honey and 1/2 tsp salt flakes in a medium saucepan over medium heat. Bring to a simmer, stirring occasionally, and cook for 2 minutes until sugar has dissolved and the mixture has thickened. Remove from heat and stir in puffed rice and coconut, mixing well to combine. Press into base of the prepared pan. Chill for 20 minutes until firm.

For the cheesecake filling, soak gelatine in a bowl of cold water for 5 minutes to soften. Place 1/2 cup (125ml) coconut cream in a small saucepan over medium heat and bring to just below the boil. Squeeze excess water from gelatine and whisk into the warmed coconut cream. Set aside to cool slightly.

Place cream cheese, remaining 275ml coconut cream, thickened cream, icing sugar and vanilla in a food processor and whiz until smooth. Add coconut cream mixture and whiz until well combined. Pour over puffed rice base. Smooth the surface. Chill for 4 hours or until set.

Meanwhile, for the passionfruit topping, place passionfruit pulp, lemon juice and sugar in a small saucepan over high heat. Bring to the boil and simmer for 4-5 minutes until reduced slightly. Set aside to cool, then spoon over cheesecake.

Cut into bars to serve.




